VANCOUVER, BC – The Autism Society of British Columbia ("ASBC") announced today that it has launched ASBC Talent Bank (https://asbctalentbank.com/) — an online tool to help parents and Behaviour Interventionists (BIs) find each other, province wide.

As part of their 40th Anniversary, the ASBC has created an online 'reference tool' that is a self-serve database of Behaviour Interventionists looking for work, allowing those looking for BI work, or searching for BIs to join their home-based treatment teams, to find each other anywhere in the province of BC. It is hoped that this new initiative will address the need for those receiving autism training to get job placements in their area of interest within their community, regardless of how remote it is. It is hoped that this new initiative will help individuals, families and organizations looking for a BI, find one.

This is important because the autism numbers are staggering. 1 in 68 Canadians are diagnosed with Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) and early and timely access to intensive behaviour intervention is crucial to outcome and treatment success. Here in British Columbia 56,000 individuals are diagnosed with ASD. Those under the age of 6 (1,700) and those between the ages of 6-19 (9,600) have a combined \$95 million dollar government treatment allotment, but are often hard-pressed, or even desperate, to find people to hire for entry level positions on their treatment teams — particularly those in rural and remote BC communities.

"When you look at those autism numbers and consider that the Canadian youth unemployment numbers are rising, with graduates often struggling to carve out a solid career path in an area earmarked for growth, it's time to do something.", says Tamara Leger, Director of Special Projects, who created the tool. "We created this website to help Behaviour Interventionists and families find each other, no matter where they live in British Columbia."

In addition to running "BI Basics Training Workshops" throughout the province, the ASBC felt the acute need for an online BI matching tool. The result is the development of the "ASBC Talent Bank" (https://asbctalentbank.com/) that will make it easier for families to support Behaviour Intervention as a treatment model in their community.

"I am very excited about creating an online provincial platform and sharing it with our province-wide Autism Society of BC membership. It is the magic of momentum that was created over four decades of partnership, vision and collaboration in the field of autism treatment — with an overriding goal to continually improve on what is there to help make things better for those with Autism Spectrum Disorder.", says Laurie Guerra, Autism Society of BC Vice-President.
